OUR PROMISE TO YOU

SERVICE

In 2022, Guthrie County REC:

- built 11.5 miles of single-phase line
- built 1.5 miles of three-phase line
- installed 43 new overhead line services
- installed 37 new underground line services

GROWTH

In 2022, Guthrie County REC:

- worked with several utilities to convert the Woodward substation from 34 kVa to 69 kVa. This conversion adds power and reliability to better handle increasing electric load.
- installed a 5,000 kVa dual wound transformer in the Panorama substation which allowed the conversion of 69 kVa.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT

In 2022, Guthrie County REC:

- awarded \$5,000 in college scholarships to five deserving students in the AC/GC, Audubon, Coon Rapids-Bayard, Exira-Elk Horn-Kimballton, and Panorama school districts whose parents are co-op members. Two of those scholarships were awarded to individuals pursuing a lineman degree.
- linemen Loyd Hise and Brian Marso participated in Farm Safety Day. Teaching opportunities allow our linemen to demonstrate the lineman's job, talk about schooling and training, teach electrical safety practices, and educate students about the electric cooperative. Third graders from AC/GC, Coon Rapids-Bayard, Panorama, and West Central Valley participate in Farm Safety Day every May.
- donated \$10,000 to the Little Charger Early Learning Center, along with contributions from board member Joni Rees and her husband Mike, and private funding, with a match from the CoBank Sharing Success Program, to help with the construction of a new facility.
- donated \$250 to the Mary J. Barnett Memorial Library in recognition of volunteer Rebecca Carico.

GIVING BACK

FINANCIAL

In 2022, Guthrie County REC:

- Board of Directors allocated \$1,168,555.66 of the 2021 margin to GCREC members. The margin is divided into four categories, and allocated as follows: patronage dividends \$800,752.83, reserve for contingency losses and expenses \$200,000, and statutory surplus \$167,802.83.
- Board of Directors approved a pay out of dividends totaling \$653,328.25 to members who received electric service in 2006, 2011 (partial), 2012 (partial) and 2021 (partial).

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & GROWTH

Guthrie County REC granted a \$150,000 revolving loan fund to Perry Economic Development for a 30,000 square-foot shell building located in the Perry Industrial Park. Guthrie County REC's power supplier, CIPCO, and Minburn Communications contributed \$600,000 to the loan to help move the project forward.

Additionally, the cooperative:

- purchased land in Perry for new Bluejay substation;
- purchased land in Audubon for new Mockingbird substation; and
- signed new 40-year Wholesale Power Contract with power supplier, CIPCO.
