On behalf of the staff and board of directors of Guthrie County REC, I'm pleased to present you with the 2023 Annual Report. In these pages you'll find the people behind your power and the work they do every day to make sure the electricity you purchase from us is safe, reliable and affordable.

In 2023, your cooperative made great strides in growth with the addition of two new substations in our service territory. The first near Perry and the second near Hamlin will both support rural business expansions in those areas. We are fortunate that our financial decisions are quided by a board of directors made up of your friends and neighbors, people who, just like you, want to do what's best for the cooperative *and* the community.

As approved in our 2023 Capital Budget, the cooperative purchased a new trencher and trailer. The addition of this equipment to our fleet will benefit the speed and ease at which we can build underground line. Where possible, burying electric lines helps avoid damage or outages caused by high winds, ice, or accidents, making the lines more reliable than those above ground.

In June, we said goodbye to our line superintendent Curt Knapp, who retired after 32 years of dedicated service. Veteran lineman Josh Oltmann now fills the role and oversees the line projects that will lead us into the next decade and beyond. We also welcomed Michael Moore as a new board member. His leadership and dedication will be valuable to guiding the board forward.

Personally, I'd like to thank those who have reached out to us, whether it's with a question, a personal visit to drop off your utility bill, or a shout out on social media. You remind us in these small ways that you're the reason we're here, vesterday, today and tomorrow.

SERVICE

In 2023, Guthrie County REC:

- built 16.5 miles of overhead line.
- built 0.33 miles of underground line.
- added 33 new services.
- rebuilt 13 existing services.
- acquired a new trencher and trailer from Vermeer for underground line as earmarked in the 2023 capital budget.

GROWTH

In 2023, Guthrie County REC:

- purchased two new 5,000 kVa dual wound transformers for our new Mockingbird substation near Hamlin and Bluejay substation near Perry. These substations add power and reliability to support business expansions in both areas.
- updated breakers in our Woodward and Adair substations.



FINANCIAL

In 2023:

The Board of Directors allocated \$632,328.18 of the 2022 The Board of Directors approved a pay out of dividends margin to GCREC members. The margin is divided into four totaling \$577,970.39 to members who received electric categories, and allocated as follows: patronage dividends service in 2007, 2013 (partial), and 2022 (partial). \$447,299.60, reserve for contingency losses and expenses, statutory surplus \$185,028.58, and education reserve.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT

- Guthrie County REC awarded \$5,000 in college scholarships to five deserving students in the AC/GC, Audubon, Coon Rapids-Bayard, and WCV school districts whose parents are cooperative members. Two of those scholarships were awarded to individuals pursuing a lineman degree.
- Marlene Chalfant, Jeremy Gruber, and Todd Tinken participated in the Guthrie County ISU Extension and Outreach's STEM Fest in April. Students were invited to learn more about electric cooperatives and what it means to be a lineworker. Students could try on virtual reality headsets to see what it's like to be in a bucket truck, climbing a pole, or clearing vegetation from around power lines.
